

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



he past year has been a remarkable one for the Adams County Children's Advocacy Center (ACCAC). June 2016 marked the 10th anniversary of the opening of the Center. With more than 1,060 children and families served since its opening, this past year the Center provided services to more children than in any previous year. Our theme of 10 Years of Hope and Healing represents the opportunities the ACCAC has provided to child abuse victims to tell their stories and rebuild their lives.

During the past year the Center has extended mental health service hours so that more children have the opportunity to participate in trauma-informed therapy interventions. We have collaborated with other professionals and organizations to support the Trauma-Informed Adams County initiative, which provides training to improve the community response to traumatized individuals. In April, we partnered with Over the Rainbow/Franklin County Children's Advocacy Center for our annual child abuse prevention conference. April also included our successful reaccreditation through the National Children's Alliance (NCA), which certifies that our Center continues to meet high professional standards for each of its programs.

This annual report presents a timeline of events since the opening of the ACCAC, which reflects many changes and enhancements to our facility and our programs and services. It reflects the tireless work of those involved who fight to assure children and their families have a safe and responsive place to share their stories and move beyond their trauma.

It is because of the tireless collaboration of our Multidisciplinary Investigative Team (MDIT), our committed board, staff, and volunteers, and the continued support of our community that we are able to help child victims and their families in Adams County. We thank everyone who is dedicated to our mission.

THE HISTORY OF THE CAC

The National Children's Advocacy Center (NCAC),

located in Huntsville, Alabama, revolutionized the United States' response to child sexual abuse. Created in 1985, the NCAC has served as a model for the 900+ Children's Advocacy Centers (CACs) now operating in the United States and in more than 25 countries throughout the world. The CAC model, which includes a Multidisciplinary Investigative Team (MDIT) approach was developed by former Congressman Robert E. "Bud" Cramer and a group of key individuals, including law

he year 2016 marks the 10th anniversary of the opening of the Adams County Children's Advocacy Center. This year's annual report provides a glimpse of all that has transpired over the past 10 years. It includes milestones of the Center, including the June 2006 ribbon-cutting ceremony and open house, hiring of an executive director and a forensic interviewer, establishing medical, mental health, and victim advocacy services, and accreditation by the National Children's Alliance (NCS) in 2011, followed by successful reaccreditation in 2016. And in between, so many changes and accomplishments have occurred it is impossible to name them all within this report.

Our community partnerships, education, and outreach continue to be strong. Our partners-Children and Youth Services, law enforcement, prosecutors, victim advocates, and mental health professionals-who assess, investigate, and treat child abuse victims work tirelessly and often go unnoticed. They are the operations of the CAC model. We will continue to serve child abuse victims and their families while stressing the importance of child abuse prevention.

For all of us to continue to do our work, we need the community to maintain its strong commitment to supporting the work that must be done. As you review the annual report and see all that has been done in our community for child abuse victims and in prevention and outreach, I hope you too will continue your commitment to the sustainability of the center and to the children in our community.

enforcement, criminal justice, child protective services, and medical and mental health workers into one coordinated team. The NCAC earned national recognition and began to train others in addressing this critical issue. Other communities began to model this approach and response to child abuse. Prior to the development of the Children's Advocacy Center model, social service and criminal justice systems were not working together in an effective manner but were adding to the emotional trauma of child abuse victims through the repetitive process being used.

HISTORY OF THE ADAMS COUNTY CHILDREN'S ADVOCACY CENTER

The history of the Adams County Children's Advocacy Center (ACCAC) began in 2005 when local responders came together as a task force to form a Children's Advocacy Center (CAC) in Adams County, Pennsylvania. Through a grassroots community movement, the Center was established within a year, and was an operational CAC by September 2006. Through the ACCAC, Adams County has a structure for countywide collaboration, providing best practices protocol for the investigation and treatment of child abuse.




